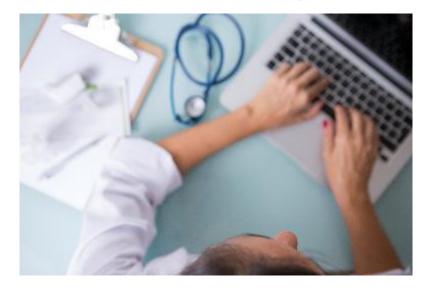

What is Health Information Exchange?

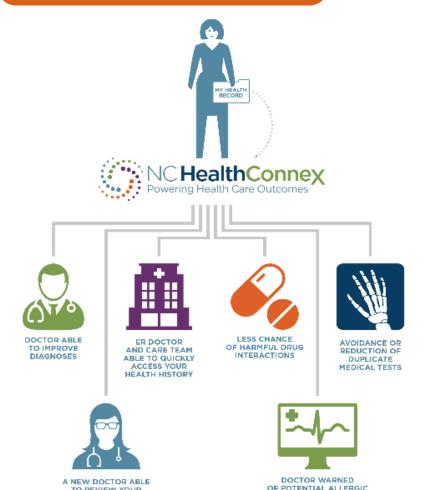
A health information exchange (HIE) is a secure, electronic network that gives authorized health care providers the ability to access and share health-related information across a statewide information highway.





Health Information Exchange

Benefits



- A full "picture" of a person's health, including ambulatory visits, hospitalizations and medications
- Reduction in valuable staff time spent phoning and faxing other providers involved in a patient's care to track down health information
- Timely access to important health events as they happen to patients (near, real-time notifications)
- Improved, more accurate and timely medication reconciliation that reduces errors and avoids unnecessary tests
- Access to test results, reducing costly duplicative tests and gaps in treatment

PARTNERSHIP

- The North Carolina General Assembly created the North Carolina Health Information Exchange Authority (NC HIEA) in 2015 to facilitate the creation of a modernized HIE to better serve North Carolina's health care providers and their patients. (NCGS 90-414.7)
- Housed within the Department of Information Technology's Government Data Analytics Center (GDAC).
- Technology partner is SAS Institute.
- Twelve-member <u>Advisory Board</u> made up of various health care representatives that includes the DHHS Secretary, DIT Secretary and GDAC Director.

NC HealthConnex by the Numbers

We connect health care providers to safely and securely share health information through a trusted network to improve health care quality and outcomes for North Carolinians.



NC HealthConnex, By the Numbers:

- 60,000+ providers with contributed records
- 8,000+ health care facilities live submitting data, including 140 hospitals
- 5,000+ health care facilities in onboarding
- 150 million+ continuity of care documents (CCDs)
- 11 million+ unique patient records with clinical documents
- 80 Electronic Health Record (EHR) vendors live
- 22+ border and interstate HIEs connected via the eHealth Exchange and the Patient Centered Data Home, including connections to the VA and DoD

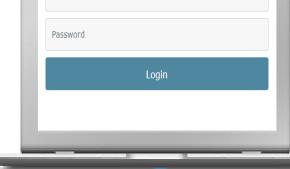

What Does the Law Mandate?

- Under a law passed in 2015, the North Carolina Health Information Exchange Authority was created to oversee and administer the N.C. Health Information Exchange Network (NCGS 90-414.7).
- Certain providers who receive state funds for the provision of health care services are required to connect and submit patient clinical and demographic data to the HIE by certain dates; January 1, 2023, deadline to connect
- Vision for connectivity to break down data siloes, improve quality of care and support whole person care



Important Updates

- The NC HIEA is launching a pilot to integrate pharmacy claims data with the clinical records in NC HealthConnex.
- The enforcement mechanism is temporarily suspended "until a bill designating a lead agency responsible for enforcement of the Statewide Health Information Exchange Act is enacted into law."
- The connection deadline of January 1, 2023, remains unchanged.
- In March 2023, the General Assembly will receive a report outlining the status of organizations that met – or failed to meet – the January 1, 2023, connection and submission deadline.



Update for Dental Providers

- It remains mandatory for dental providers to connect to NC HealthConnex by the January 1st, 2023 deadline.
- In March of 2022, the NC HIEA advisory board recommended to the General Assembly that dental providers be reclassified as "voluntary" connections to NC HealthConnex; however, the General Assembly chose not to act on this recommendation.
- Organizations that have signed a participation agreement with NC HIEA but are not yet live and submitting data by January 1, 2023, are considered to be making good-faith efforts to connect.



Pharmacies

- The NC HIEA is launching a pilot to integrate pharmacy claims data with the clinical records in the statewide HIE.
- This effort is one of the first of its kind nationally to aggregate dispense data with clinical data to provide a more complete health records for North Carolinians at the point of care.
- Both large retail pharmacies and smaller, independent pharmacies are participating in the pilot.
- Technical specifications will become available once the pilot is complete.
- Because the pilot remains in progress, the NC HIEA views pharmacies that have signed participation agreements as acting in good faith to meet the January 1, 2023 deadline.



How Do Providers Meet the Mandate?

1. Participation Agreement (PA)

- Legal document governing exchange of data.
- Must be in place before the technical build can begin.
- Types of Agreements
 - Full
 - Traditional Providers/Parent Entities
 - Pharmacy
 - Submit Only
 - Traditional Providers/Parent Entities
 - Pharmacy
- NC HealthConnex Participation Agreement

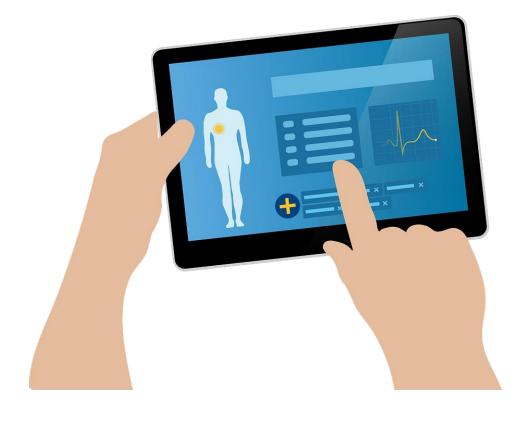




How Do Providers Meet the Mandate? (cont.)

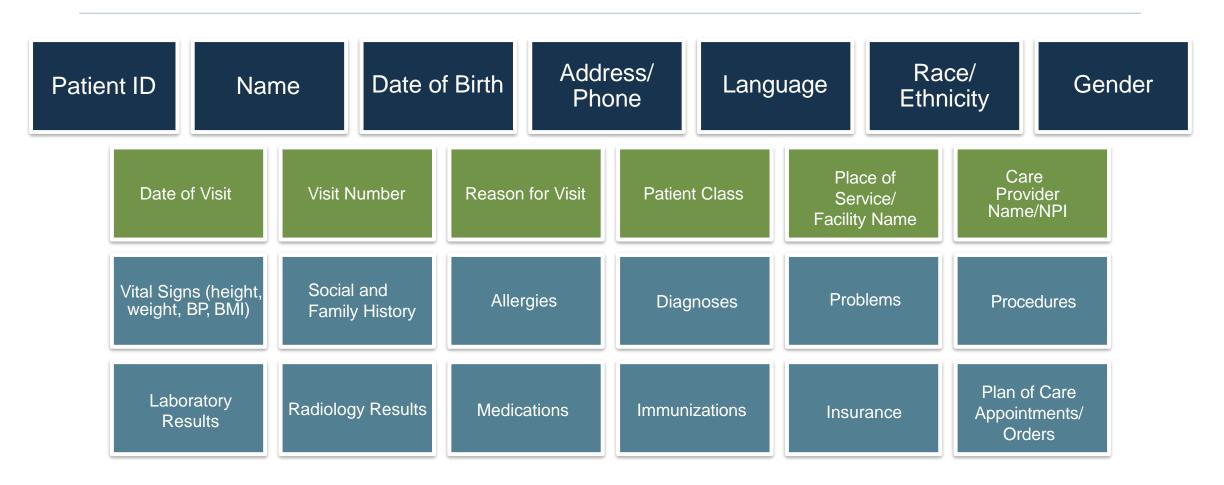
2. Electronic Health Record (EHR) system

- Need to have an EHR that can send HL7 messages (version 2.0 & higher) or CCD.
- <u>Electronic Health Record Vendor</u>

Privacy & Security

NC HealthConnex is a secure, private network

- The NC HIEA follows the highest information security standards available
- Information is always encrypted and sent over a private network
- NC HealthConnex is compliant with all federal and state privacy and security laws
- Information that identifies patients will not be sold in any way or shared with anyone other than authorized health care providers or organizations that have entered into HIPAA compliant, data-sharing agreements

User Access

We take our role of data stewards seriously and expect that our participants will as well.

- Role-based access to control access levels for each authorized user
- Participant Account Administrator (PAA) will be responsible for assigning roles to users; NC HealthConnex Help Desk will provide credentials to these users (<u>PAA Reference Guide</u>)
- Access to patient information granted if established treatment relationship with the patient

Opt Out

North Carolina is an opt out state (since 2012). Patients are opted into health information exchange for HIPAA-approved treatment, payment and operations purposes across all information exchanges (public and private).

The HIE Act requires participating health care providers to provide education materials to patients on the benefits of health information exchange and their right to opt out of exchange (or rescind).

The NC HIEA provides:

- Sample notice of privacy practices
- Tri-fold brochure order form
- Talking points, FAQs, Fact sheet
- Employee education materials

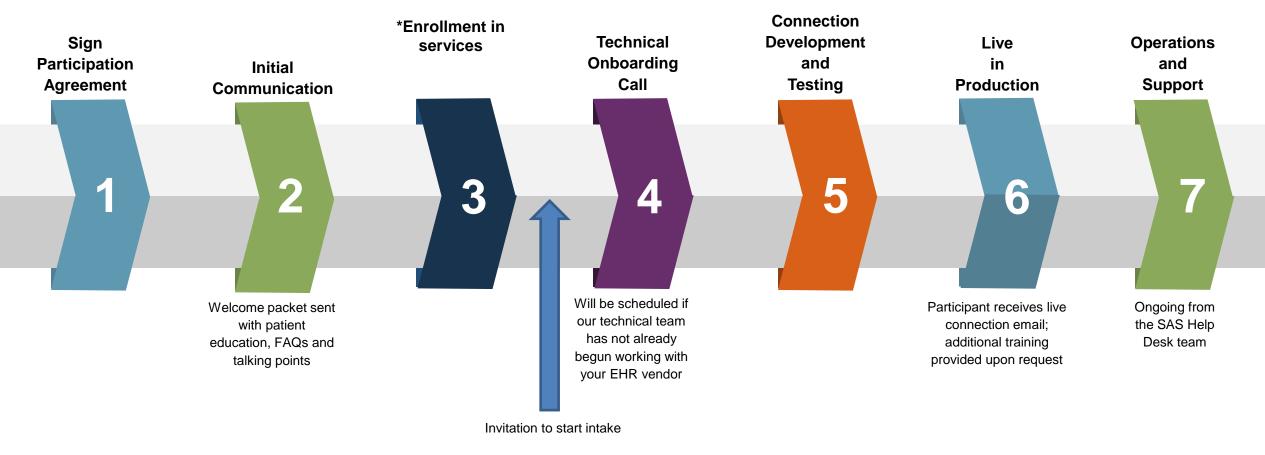

Notifications

Benefits — NC*Notify

- Providers are notified when their patients have received care in other care settings
- Schedule follow up appointments with patients
- Follow up on medications prescribed or other discharge instructions
- Insight to provide continuity in care to <u>reduce avoidable readmissions</u>
- Insight to <u>achieve financial goals</u> under value-based care contracts
- Utilize for compliance with state and federal quality initiatives, including Meaningful Use/Promoting Interoperability

- Self Service Panel Loader
- NC*Notify Dashboard within the Clinical Portal
