Academic Health Department: A Primer

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AHD Definition

"a formalized relationship 'between an academic institution and a governmental public health agency which provides mutual benefits in teaching, research, and service, with academia informing the practice of public health, and the governmental public health agency informing the academic program."

What's the work or activities?

- Assistance with program, policy and/or system design, implementation, and evaluation, including grant writing
- Trainings and workforce development
- Technical assistance, literature reviews, best practice finding
- Guest lecturing and faculty appointments
- Practice-based research
- Service delivery, rapid response teams, surge capacity
- And more...

How is the work accomplished?

Through:

- practica, internships, capstone projects, class projects
- faculty and staff/health department employee in-residence at the other's institution
- lunch and learns, workshops, system design collaborations
- In-community work
- Consultations, serving on boards, coalitions, committees
- And more...

Formalized Relationship



- Can be documented with a memorandum of understanding, affiliation agreement, contract, letter outlining a partnership, etc.
 - Some might need legal review—this is a consideration for which route you may want to go.
- OK to start with a handshake agreement to get started, but ultimately ideal to have a written document.
