A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE NORTH CAROLINA PUBLIC HEALTH ASSOCIATION, INC.

On a warm afternoon, June 16, 1909, the seed of a public health organization was planted. Dr. L. N. Glenn, Superintendent of Health, Gaston County, provided the idea. Dr. Richard H. Lewis, Secretary and Treasurer, N.C. State Board of Health, assisted by county superintendents of health he had summoned for the purpose, earnestly tilled the ground. The Host State Medical Society, meeting in the Battery Park Hotel in Asheville, benignly added its blessing.

Two years and four days of germination, June 20, 1911, produced a lusty sprout named the North Carolina Health Officers Association. Forty-seven county superintendents of health, eight municipal health officers, and twenty-one members of boards of health met to herald the event at the behest of Dr. Watson S. Rankin during the annual meeting of the State Medical Society in Charlotte. Dr. Richard H. Lewis spoke enthusiastically about "The advantages of a North Carolina Health Officers Association." A Constitution and By-Laws was adopted. Dr. L. B. McBrayer of Asheville was named President; Dr. L. N. Glenn of Gastonia, Vice-President; and Dr. Watson S. Rankins of Raleigh, Secretary-Treasurer. The first prophetic action of this embryonic organization was the passage of a resolution calling upon the conjoint session of the State Board of Health and the State Medical Society to recommend a uniform basis of compensation for health officers for adoption by the County Societies.

As the ranks of public health workers grew, many found that they had no professional home, no forum, no planned association. This problem received prompt recognition and characteristic action from the Health Officers's Association. Meeting in Pinehurst, April 25, 1921, the Association agreed to change its name to the "North Carolina Public Health Association," and the Constitution and By-Laws were amended, opening the membership to all members and employees of boards of health, either state, county, or municipal, and any citizen interested in public health.

Organizational growing pains were felt as membership began to increase. Secretaries found the erudite discussions of the Health Officers remote rom the tasks and problems encountered daily in efficient office, and Sanitarians wondered why they should be concerned with the frequency of immunizations when technical matters like measures for the prevention of foodborne disease needed discussion. The creation of scientific sections within the North Carolina Public Health Association solved the problem. Beginning in the 29th Annual Meeting in Pinehurst, 1940, Scientific Sections were formed for Health Officers, Public Health Nurses, Secretaries, and Sanitarians. The Laboratory Section was created two years later. Following in later years were Health Education, Nutrition, Veneral Disease Control, and the Mental Health Section. Two affiliate organizations, the Western North Carolina Public Health Association and Eastern North Carolina Public Health Association were accepted in 1960.

Organizational influence has increased and expanded. The joining of the State Legislative Council, then consisting of 19 member organizations, gave the North Carolina Public Health Association four voting representatives in that body and added the voice of public health to that of others in urging passage of needed social legislation. In 1951, through the efforts of Dr. J. W. R. Norton, the NCPHA was formally affiliated with the American Public Health Association, giving the Tar Heel worker a voice in the formulation of national health policy.

Physical growth has been a vital factor in the total accomplishments and influence of the organizations. From the seventy-six original members of a half-century ago, the NCPHA, Inc. now boasts a membership of well over fourteen hundred.

Effectively promoting the causes of public health and its practitioners for half a century, this composite entity called the North Carolina Public Health Association, Inc. confidently faces the future. Fortified by the memory of the dauntless stalwarts of the past, infused with the spirit of the daring present, and excited by the adventure of greater service to the well-being of man, the Association has come to the full bloom of maturity, offering to all who serve and all who are being served, a rewarding experience in living for health and healthful living.

1984 N.C.P.H.A. ANNUAL MEETING WORKSHOP DESCRIPTIONS

Thursday A.M.

1. NATIONAL HEALTH CARE PRIORITIES IN THE 80's

This workshop will feature Glenna M. Crooks, Ph.D., Deputy Assistant Secretary, Department of Health and Human Services. She will present the health care priorities of the Public Health Services in the next 10 years and strategies that health professionals can impact on determining these national priorities. She will also identify the participants who influence this policy development process. Dr. Crook's presentation is sponsored by the Nursing Section.

2. LEGAL TOOLS FOR ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH PROGRAMS: FIVE CASE STUDIES

This session is sponsored by the Sanitation Branch, Environmental Health Section and will feature legal cases dealing with Environmental Health in North Carolina. Key environmental health leaders in the state will present five case histories of court action. Sanitarians will be shown specific examples of how to properly prepare for a judicial action. The guest speakers will be C. D. Knight, Jr., R.S.; Tom Williamson, R.S.; Steve J. Steinbeck; Harry W. Whitley, Jr., R.S.; Donald W. Stephens, R.S.; and C. A. Laws, R.S.

3. CONSIDERATIONS FOR LOW LITERACY TRAINING

This workshop is a must for all public health professionals. It will focus on how to reach the client with low literacy skills. it will include indentifying reading levels of educational material, major steps to be taken to rewrite materials at an easier reading level and explain the relationship between a client's culture and his utilization of written material. At least three methods will be described that can be used in public health education workshops other than lecture and discussion. This workshop is sponsored by the Health Education Section and the guest speaker is Arlene Fingeret, Ph.D., Assistant Professor, Department of Adult and Community College Education, N.C. State University.

4. NUTRITION SERVICES TO THE HANDICAPPED, DEVELOPMENTAL DELAYED POPULATION

This workshop will present, the results of a special project which studied the nutritional needs and resources for the developmental delayed and crippled children's population in North Carolina. In addition, the special needs and resources from the national perspective will be explored. The Nutrition Section is sponsoring the workshop and featured speakers are Josephine Cialone, RDMS, Nutrition Consultant, Nutrition and Dietary Services Branch, Division of Health Services and Deria Foster Moore, RDMS, Nutrition Specialist, Department of Health and Human Services.

5. ASSERTIVENESS TRAINING WORKSHOP

Dr. Dan Chartier, Director Staff Development Services, North Carolina Department of Community Colleges, will lead this workshop which will help us develop skills in interpersonal communications. The workshop is on assertiveness training and will be divided into three basic parts: Assertiveness Level Assesment, Assertiveness Tools, followed by a question and answer/problem solving session. The workshop is sponsored by Management Support Section, NCPHA.

6. TECHNIQUES USED IN INDIAN MEDICINE FOR FACILITATING HOLISTIC HEALTH

This workshop features J. T. Garrett, Ph.D. of the U.S. Public Health Services who is also a medicine man for Eastern Cherokee Indians. The presentation will make health professionals more aware of the comparisons of Indian Medicine with wellness, Health Education, an patient care techniques. The traditional Indian concepts of legends and value teachings have value today in helping people make good health choices. Indian medicine also has practical value to the Chronic and Stress - disease laden public we serve. The presentation inclues some traditional Indian techniques such as a feather, a crystal, and a rattle with chants used as detection techniques with patient/client involvement in care and wellness. Discussions on healing will focus on self care and a creative wellness approach used by the traditional medicine man. The presentation will focus on

roup involvement to emphasize the traditions of caln-family-tribe participation. A discussion on some common herbs, nutrition and natural diet will be focused on wellness patterned after Indian medicine as a way of life. This workshop is sponsored by Western Carolina University, Environmental Health Program.

7. THE FUTURE OF SANITARIANS AND NORTH CAROLINA STATE UNIVERSITY EXTENSION FOODHANDLING PROGRAM

Dr. Monroe Morgan, Director of Environmental Health, East Tennessee State University will introduce sanitarians to the current technology of environmental health issues, and their implications for future educational needs of the sanitarian. Dr. Max Gregory, Assistant Director, Food Science Department, N.C State University, will present ideas on preparing foodhandler courses and provide the latest techniques involved in quality foodhandling for foodhandler personnel. Mecklenburg County Health Department is sponsoring this workshop.

9. PREVENTION OF CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT

This workshop, taught by Mr. George Bryan, Executive Director of the Exchange Club's Center for the Prevention of Child Abuse of N.C.. Inc. is designed to provide information on the extent of the problem of child abuse in North Carolina. A part of the workshop will include an audivovisual presentation made in North Carolina. The presentation gives an effective overview of child abuse, statistics specific for North Carolina and gives example of a prevention program. This workshop is sponsored by the Children and Youth Team, North Central Regional Office, Division of Health Services.

10. MATERNAL - FETAL ENVIRONMENT

A panel of health professionals will explore the impact of the environment on the fetus and the maternal patient. This is expected to be an excellent program covering such topics as:

-Environmental health hazards to pregnant women in the work place.
-Current opinion and research regarding the use of ultrasound in pregnancy.
-Relationship of maternal stress on pregnancy outcomes.
-The clinical and programmatic implications relating to maternal-fetal environment.

The panel of speakers includes Dr. Jonathan Kotch, School of Public Health; Dr. Michael Rosenberg, Family Health International; Roscoe Moore, D.V.M. Center for Devices, U.S. Public Health Service; Lynne Hall, R.N., Ph.D., Department of Maternal Child Health, School of Public Health, University of North Carolina; Marilyn Jones, ACSW, FAHEC; and Robert Brame, M.D., OB-GYN Teaching Services, Wake AHEC. This workshop is sponsored by the Maternal Child Health Section.

11. INTRODUCTION TO THE PROBLEM OF PREMENSTRAUL SYNDROME

A topic of growing interest in the field of women's health is premenstrual syndrome. To update participants in this topic will be Sheila Cromer, R.N., M.S., FPNP, and Carol Hoffman, M.D. of the Piedmont Premenstrual Syndrome Program. New techniques, practices, and trends within the health field that can be utilized to promote positive outcomes for women with PMS will be discussed. Health Education section is sponsoring this workshop.

13. FOOD SANITATION AND SAFETY IN 1984

This session is sponsored by the Department of Environmental Health at East Carolina University. One of their faculty, Dr. Barney Kane, will review the current status of foodborne diseases and food handling practices. The workshop will be based in part upon the recommendations of the Second National Food Protection Conference. There are many new developments in food procession and packaging. There are also some new kinds of outbreaks of foodborne disease. The workshop will emphasize mechanisms for control of these diseases in commercial food service operations. The presentation will be illustrated with slides and anecdotal accounts of outbreaks.

14. THE SELECTIVE NON-TREATMENT OF HANDICAPPED PERSONS - IMPLICATIONS FOR PUBLIC POLICY

"No, I cannot help you", Dr. Harmon L. Smith, Professor of Moral Theology and Professor of Community and Family Medicine at Duke University will discuss the question of the moral and bio-ethical issues involved with providing treatment to the severely handicapped person. Rehabilitation/Developmental Disabilities Section is sponsoring this mini-workshop.

15. SEXUALLY TRANSMITTED DISEASE AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH

The workshop will provide public and private providers of STD services with up-to-date information for managing sexually active women of reproductive age. Due to the expanding spectrum of sexually transmitted disease and our increasing knowledge of sequellae adversely affecting reproductive health, it is essential that providers seeing females be knowledgeable about the latest guidelines for managing this crucial category of patients. Information will include suggested criteria for screening women for STD, which presentation syndromes are suggestive of possible STD and current laboratory information and treatment guidelines. Improved management of reproductive age women with sexually transmitted disease will inevitably result in reduced sequellae of disease, thereby reducing the large human and monetary cost attributable to these sequellae. This workshop is sponsored by the Sexually Transmitted Disease/Immunization Section.


