Current issues and developments concerning AIDS will be discussed. Topics will include the recently funded AIDS Education grant, HIV testing and counseling, new developments in treatment, and the outlook for AIDS in North Carolina.

Dr. Rebecca Meriwether will be conducting the workshop. Dr. Meriwether is Head of the Communicable Disease Control Branch, North Carolina Division of Health Services. This workshop is sponsored by the Sexually Transmitted Disease/Immunizations Section.

#### THE HOLISTIC APPROACH TO FAMILY HEALTH CARE

This workshop will present a framework for understanding family problem solving, especially as it relates to health and social well-being. Interdisciplinary strategies and interventions to enhance family health will be explored.

The format of the workshop will be discussion and group exercise and dissemination of resources and handouts. This workshop is sponsored by the Social Work Section.

#### INFECTION CONTROL IN LOCAL HEALTH DEPARTMENTS

Dr. William Anthony Rutala, Research Associate Professor, Division of Infectious Diseases, Department of Medicine, UNC School of Medicine, Chapel Hill, North Carolina, will conduct this workshop sponsored by the Laboratory Section.

Dr. Rutala is one of the leading infection control experts in the country and is presently working on Standards for the Division of Health Services for infection control in local health departments. This makes this mini workshop a must for all health professionals, especially those who deal with infectious materials in any way. With the increase in Hepatitis cases, HTLV III testing, and a general increase in infectious patients being seen in our Health Departments, it is imperative that we learn all we can about how to control the spread of infection to our clients as well as to our own personnel.

#### MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS IN THE USE OF HSIS DATA

Charles J. Rothwell, State Center for Health Statistics, will briefly review the data that are collected through HSIS. Time will then be spent on the various management reports available through HSIS and how they might be used. Also, information will be provided on how HSIS data can be linked to other health data sets to help measure program outcome. Finally, a view of future development for HSIS will be provided. This workshop is sponsored by the Statistics and Epidemiology Section.

#### AGING—SOCIETY'S CHALLENGE

The North Carolina AHEC Library/Information Network, under the leadership of Patricia L. Thibodeau, Director of Information and Media Services, will sponsor a Media Festival featuring films on geriatrics and issues on care of the aged. Six to eight films will be shown at scheduled times and some will be repeated. The session will be "open" so that individuals can walk in and out during the films. There will be handouts giving information on the films shown and how they can be obtained.

#### **NEIGHBOR HELPING NEIGHBOR**

This workshop, led by Lisa Tucker, Community Health Advocacy Program Coordinator, is sponsored by the Nursing Services Section. Emphasis will be on utilizing community people as resources to reach others who are in need. Their goal is to improve community health and awareness.

Also on the program will be a Community Health Advocate to share ways that advocates work within the community. The attendants should leave with a general understanding of Community Health Advocacy Program, a feel for the importance of outreach using local leaders, and, hopefully, some excitement about the opportunity of making their programs grow and their communities healther using the Community Health Program Model.

# PARENTS SPEAK OUT: THE FAMILY PERSPECTIVE ON LIVING WITH A CHILD WITH A DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITY

This workshop will focus upon the impact of having a child with a handicapping condition on the lives and lifestyles of family members. Parents of children with disorders such as Cerebral Palsy, Down's Syndrome, and Fetal Alcohol Syndrome will share their experiences and their concerns for their children with special needs and with the health care system. Dr. Olson Huff, Developmental Pediatrician from the Asheville DEC, will lead the panel discussion and will facilitate group discussion of the film "This Child is Not Alone."

The workshop is sponsored by the Developmental Rehabilitation Section.

#### SHELLFISH SANITATION

This workshop will briefly identify the program through its history, present operation and expectations for the future. The need for public health protection from contaminated shellfish and crustacea products, in conjunction with the need for cooperative efforts from local health departments, will be stressed. Those in attendance will have the opportunity to enjoy a variety of seafood delicacies.

The workshop is sponsored by the Shellfish Sanitation Program, Sanitation Branch, Environmental Health Section, Division of Health Services.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL EPIDEMIOLOGY AND THE SANITARIAN—SWIMMING POOLS, WHIRLPOOLS, AND SPAS—MOSQUITO CONTROL AND DISEASES

The field of Environmental Health is changing. Sanitarians are approached with a wide variety of new problems with public health significance every day. As presenter of this program, John I. Freeman, DVM, will attempt to make sanitarians aware of the technical assistance available to them through the Environmental Epidemiology Branch of the Division of Health Services. How do you answer questions on lead, Randon, formaldehyde, etc.? Attend this session and find out.

Do you have a water quality problem? As presenter of this program, Dennis A. Salmen, R.S., will discuss water quality problems and how to write regulations to address them. He will also offer information on the creation of a monitoring program.

The mosquito is a proven disease vector of public health significance. As presenter of this program, Dr. Nolan H. Newton will offer the most current information on mosquito diseases and mosquito control.

This workshop is sponsored by the Environmental Health Section.

#### THE FAMILY STRUCTURE: HOW IT INFLUENCES ADOLESCENT HEALTH

In this workshop session, the video "The Vanishing Black Family" will be shown at the beginning of the session to focus the audience's attention on the issue. Each panel member will present for 15-20 minutes on specific topics and will respond to questions raised by the audience. Dr. Mary Vernon, Lincoln Community Health Center, Durham, North Carolina, will provide introductory statements, with the panel following.

The purpose of this workshop is to examine the family structure and how it influences the health of the adolescent particularly as it relates to adolescent pregnancy, suicides, and substance abuse. The workshop will also focus on what impract this has on health professionals and what can be done to produce positive outcomes.

This workshop is sponsored by the Public Health Education Section.

#### LAUNCHING HEALTHY FUTURES FOR CHILDREN

In economically hard times, what possible new directions are there for child health care in North Carolina?

The MCH and DR sections will co-sponsor a workshop on Healthy Children, a nationwide program to assist communities to develop health care services for children in need. The director, Philip J. Porter, M.D., will present an overview of the Healthy Children Project, which is supported by a Robert Wood Johnson Grant. The goal of Healthy Children is to make healthy care services accessible to children who need them, and to do so at reduced cost through imaginative and efficient use of resources — both human and fiscal — already available in local communities. Dr. Porter will challenge health care workers in North Carolina by presenting some innovative, successful models from the country.

Case presentations of two creative projects already underway in North Carolina will also be discussed.

All who care for children and have noted the recent deterioration in the status of children, e.g., increasing infant mortality rates and malnutrition, are invited to obtain new inspiration and hope from Healthy Children.

#### AGING—SOCIETY'S CHALLENGE

The North Carolina AHEC Library/Information Network will continue or repeat the presentations made during the morning workshop.

#### NUTRITIONAL IMPLICATIONS OF HYPERTENSION

A leading cause of death and disability in North Carolina, hypertension and its treatment is the subject of ongoing research.

This workshop will include updated information concerning the effects of caffeine, sodium, calcium, and medication on hypertension and nutritional status.

The speaker is Charles Cook, M.D., M.P.H., Associate Professor of Medicinu, UNC School of Medicine. Dr. Cook also has a private practice in Nephrology-Hypertension and is consultant to the National High Blood Pressure Education Program, National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute, and the National Institutes of Health.

This workshop is sponsored by the Nutrition Section.

#### SOME DIAMONDS IN OUR CROWN-

#### "of Shoes and Ships and Sealing Wax, of Cabbages and Kings"

This workshop is a must for all who wish to know from whence came local public health. O. Aiken Mays, M.D., Director of Public Health, Wayne County Health Department, Goldsboro, North Carolina, will present a retrospective view of some of our victories as well as some of our failures during the years preceding NCPHA's DIAMOND JUBILEE. Attendees will journey through the past seventy-five (75) years examining customs, diseases, treatments, political decisions, and scientific advances which impacted on society and the health care scene through the years.

#### A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE NORTH CAROLINA PUBLIC HEALTH ASSOCIATION, INC.

On a warm afternoon, June 16, 1909, the seed of a public health organization was planted. Dr. L. N. Glenn, Superintendent of Health, Gaston County, provided the idea. Dr. Richard H. Lewis, Secretary and Treasurer, N.C. State Board of Health, assisted by county superintendents of health he had summoned for the purpose, earnestly tilled the ground. The Host State Medical Society, meeting in the Battery Park Hotel in Asheville, benignly added its blessing.

Two years and four days of germination, June 20, 1911, produced a lusty sprout named the North Carolina Health Officers Association. Forty-seven county superintendents of health, eight municipal health officers, and twenty-one members of boards of health met to herald the event at the behest of Dr. Watson R. Rankin during the annual meeting of the State Medical Society in Charlotte. Dr. Richard H. Lewis spoke enthusiastically about "The advantages of a North Carolina Health Officers Association." A Constitution and By-Laws was adopted. Dr. L. B. McBrayer of Asheville was named President; Dr. L. N. Glenn of Gastonia, Vice-President; and Dr. Watson S. Rankins of Raleigh, Secretary-Treasurer. The first prophetic action of this embryonic organization was the passage of a resolution calling upon the conjoint session of the State Board of Health and the State Medical Society to recommend a uniform basis of compensat on for health officers for adoption by the County Societies.

As the ranks of public health workers grew, many found that they had no professional home, no forum, no planned association. This problem received prompt recognition and characteristic action from the Health Officers' Association. Meeting in Pinehurst, April 25, 1921, the Association agreed to change its name to the "North Carolina Public Health Association," and the Constitution and By-Laws were amended, opening the membership to all members and employees of boards of health, either state, county, or municipal, and any citizen interested in public health.

Organizational growing pains were felt as membership began to increase. Secretaries found the erudite discussions of the Health Officers remote from the tasks and problems encountered daily. Sanitarians wondered why they should be concerned with the frequency of immunizations when technical matters like measures for the prevention of foodborne disease needed discussion. The creation of scientific sections within the North Carolina Public Health Association solved the problem. Beginning in the 29th Annual Meeting in Pinehurst, 1940, Scientific Sections were formed for Health Officers, Public Health Nurses, Secretaries, and Sanitarians. The Laboratory Section was created two years later. Following in later years were Health Education, Nutrition, Venereal Disease Control, and the Mental Health Section. Two affiliate organizations, the Western North Carolina Public Health Association and Eastern North Carolina Public Health Association, were accepted in 1960.

Organizational influence has increased and expanded. The joining of the State Legislative Council, then consisting of 19 member organizations, gave the North Carolina Public Health Association four voting representatives in that body and added the voice of public health to that of others in urging passage of needed social legislation. In 1951, through the efforts of Dr. J. W. R. Norton, the NCPHA was formally affiliated with the American Public Health Association, giving the Tar Heel worker a voice in the formulation of national health policy.

Physical growth has been a vital factor in the total accomplishments and influence of the organizations. From the seventy-six original members of a half-century ago, the NCPHA, Inc. now boasts a membership of well over fourteen hundred.

Effectively promoting the causes of public health and its practitioners for half a century, this composite entity called the North Carolina Public Health Association, Inc. confidently faces the future. Fortified by the memory of the dauntless stalwarts of the past, infused with the spirit of the daring present, and excited by the adventure of greater service to the well-being of man, the Association has come to the full bloom of maturity, offering to all who serve and all who are being served a rewarding experience in living for health and healthful living.
