

is the Executive Director of the American Public Health Association (APHA) in Washington, DC. Dr. Akhter was senior advisor for the federal agency for Health Care Policy and Research in Washington prior to his appointment as the **Executive Director of APHA in** January, 1997. He was the public health commissioner in the Washington, DC Department of Human Services Commission of Public Health from 1991 to 1994. As Washington health commissioner, Dr. Akhter worked to reduce infant mortality, combat the spread of HIV/AIDS infection and tuberculosis, increase the immunization rate among children and enhance the public school health curriculum to include a condom-availability program.

has served as Vermont's governor since 1991. He has established Vermont as a national leader in the areas of children's prevention programs, health care reform and welfare reform. Vermont's investments in children have reduced child physical and sexual abuse by 30 percent and teen pregnancies by 20 percent, and have achieved a ranking of first in the nation in childhood immunizations and second in the number of children with health care coverage. Today, all low income children in Vermont have access to quality health care.


