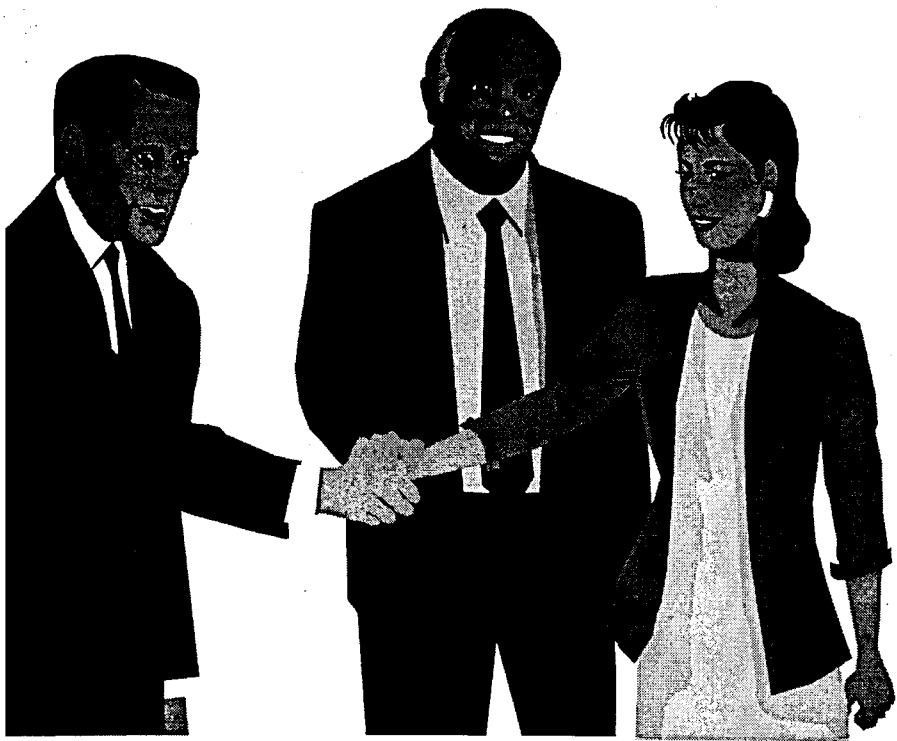

OUR KEYNOTE SPEAKER

Quentin D. Young, M.D., President, APHA

Dr. Young is a practicing Internist in Hyde Park, a Clinical Professor of Preventive Medicine at the University of Illinois Medical Center and Senior Attending Physician at Michael Reese Hospital. During the 1970's and early 1980's, he served as Chairman of the Department of Internal Medicine at Cook County Hospital, where he helped establish the Department of Occupational Medicine.

In addition to his distinguished career as a physician, Dr. Young has been a leader in public health policy and medical and social justice issues. He is currently serving as President of the American Public Health Association and in 1997 was inducted as a Master of the American College of Physicians. In 1980, Dr. Young founded the Chicago-based Health and Medicine Policy Research Group, of which he is currently Chairman. Health and Medicine is a non-profit organization created to be an advocate for the health care needs of the poor and under-served in Chicago. Dr. Young is also the National Coordinator of Physicians for a National Health Program (PNHP), a Chicago-based organization of over 9,000 physicians who support a single payer national health insurance. He has served as Chairman of the American College of Physicians' Subcommittee on Human Rights and Medical Practice and has been a member of both the Humana-Michael Reese Medical Board and the American College of Physicians Health and Public Policy Committee. Dr. Young has chosen to limit his medical practice in order to spend more time fighting the corporate takeover of medicine in America.

**William L. Roper, MD, MPH,
Dean, UNC School of Public Health**

Before joining UNC in July, 1997, Dr. Roper was senior vice president of Prudential HealthCare, where he had responsibility for medical management and other services supporting Prudential HealthCare's health plans nationwide. Dr. Roper joined Prudential in 1993 as president of the Prudential Center for Health Care Research.

Before coming to Prudential, Dr. Roper was director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), served on the senior White House staff, and was administrator of the Health Care Financing Administration (responsible for Medicare and Medicaid).

He received his MD from the University of Alabama School of Medicine, and his MPH from the University of Alabama at Birmingham School of Public Health. He completed his residency in pediatrics at the University of Colorado Medical Center.

He is a past president of the Association for Health Services Research, and is chairman of the Partnership for Prevention. He is a member of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences.

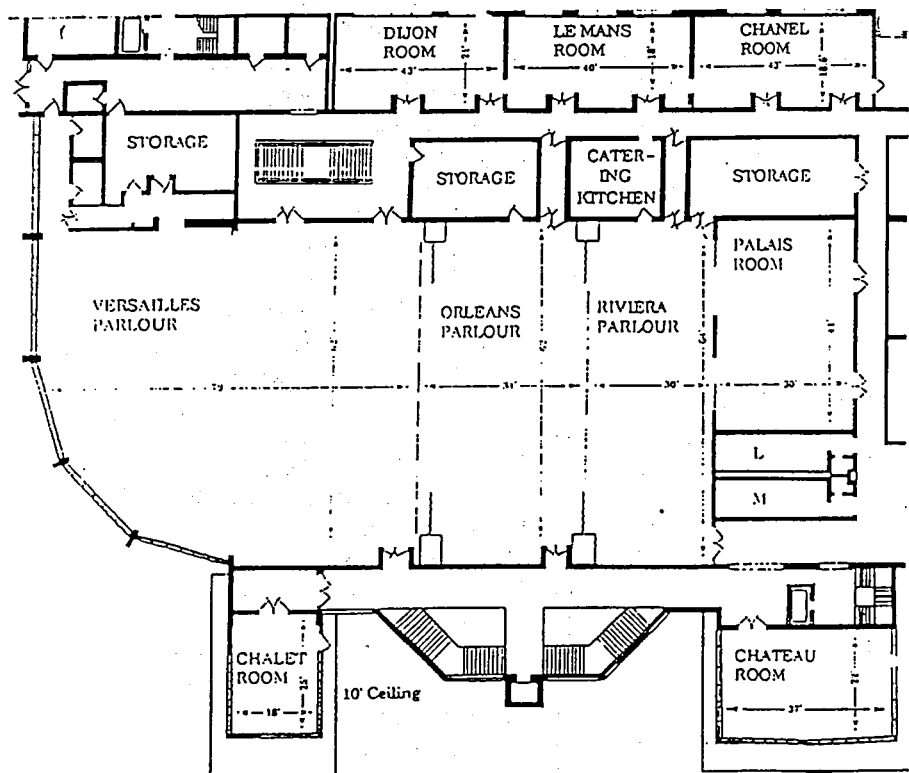

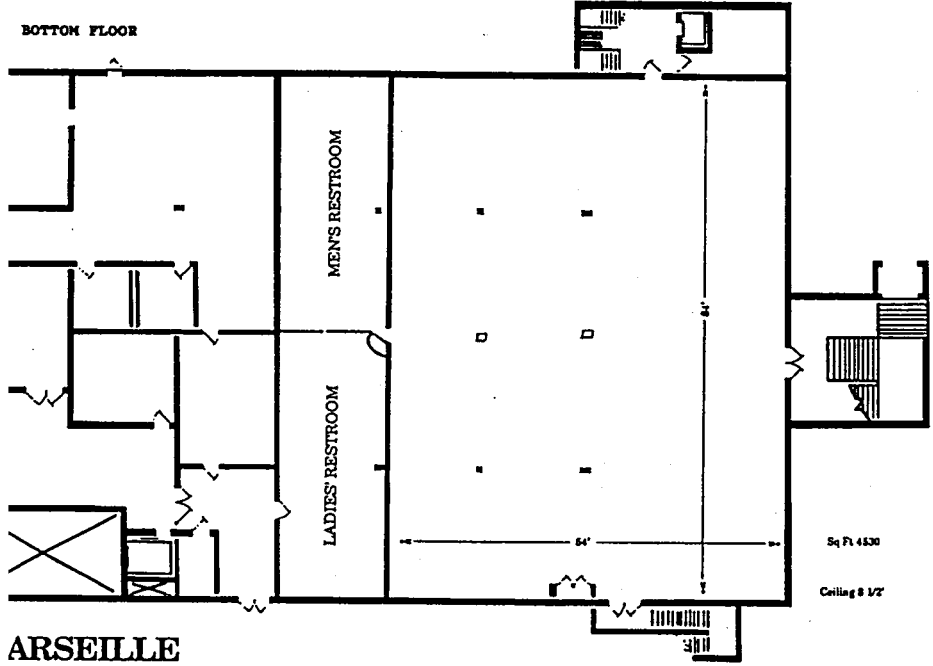
