Report from the State Health Director's Conference, January 23-24, 2014

The 2014 State Health Director's Conference was convened at the North Raleigh Hilton on January 23-24, 2014. This year's theme was *Public Health Remix* – *Transforming Public Health*. Approximately 350 state and local public health staff and staff from public health partner agencies in North Carolina attended this annual conference.

Featured national speakers included Dr. Judith Monroe, Director of the Office of State, Tribal, Local and Territorial Support, Centers for Disease Prevention and Control and Bobby Pestronk, Executive Director, National Association of County and City Health Officials. Dr. Monroe provided participants a national perspective on changes impacting public health. Mr. Pestronk

convened a panel of North Carolina Local Health Directors to discuss challenges of local consolidation and how to remain impactive to the public's health in a climate of change.

North Carolina Governor Pat Mc-Crory and NC Department of Health and Human Services Secretary Aldona Wos both spoke to participants during the Ronald Levine Awards Luncheon on January 23. They highlighted prior year achievements and upcoming priority focus areas for Governor McCrory's administration. State Health Director, Dr. Robin Cummings, provided conference opening remarks on January 23rd regarding managing change with continued challenges to achieving improved health outcomes in NC. He also partici-

pated in a panel discussion on January 24th about prescription drug abuse in our state.

The Association of North Carolina Boards of Health named Alamance County Board of Health as the 2014 Outstanding Board of Health. The Carl Durham Award was presented to former board member, Dr. Donald A Courtney of the Alamance County Board of Health.

The Ronald Levine Public Health Legacy Awardee for 2014 was named on January 23rd. Dr. Joy Reed, Branch Head for the NC Division of Public Health Local Technical Assistance and Training Branch, was honored for her lifetime achievements and contributions to public health in North Carolina.

Do you like learning about new public health topics? For the past 5 years, leading up to and during the annual Fall Educational Conference, Suzanne Lea has collected, reviewed and handled the logistics associated with having abstracts for the NON-SECTION related presentations at NCPHA. Now, with her added responsibilities as an NCPHA officer, it is no longer realistic to expect her to to shoulder this effort too. Volunteers are sought to share the responsibilities below:

Prior to conference:

- Edit the abstract form and set the submission dates based on the annual meeting planning schedule;
- Coordinate with John Rowe to get the online form set up on the Alliance website;
- Download the submissions into a Google doc spreadsheet; easy management;
- Identify a review committee;
- Review and select the abstracts;
- Notify the presenters with a generic letter that can be edited;
- Coordinate rooms and time slots with Kim, based on the deadlines set for sections;
- Answer phone calls and e-mails from submitters.

Then, during the meeting:

- Check to see if there are proctors in each room and identify one if gaps; proctors will be responsible for: set up of audio-visual (AV), screen, laptop, and other materials as needed;
- If it is the student poster or presentation session, it is best to have a NCPHA person stay the entire allotted session time;
- Order a sufficient number of large poster board mounts prior to meeting in time for delivery;
- Be present at poster hanging time, and at actual poster presentation time; there are always a ton of questions.
